


Sensory and Matching Activity

Rhyming Words



Cut words out along the lines

Tape the Red words to separate bowls or buckets and set up the bowls where it is safe to throw "Moon Rocks" into them.

If you have plenty of foil: have your child make a bunch of foil balls to be the Moon Rocks. If your foil supply is running low, your child can use crumpled paper to be the Moon Rocks.

Tape all the other words to the Moon Rocks and let your child throw rhyming words into their bowl.

Making Your Imaginary Planet

Imagine you are an astronaut, flying your rocket through outer space, and you discover a new planet.

What planet will you discover?

Before you start

Read the Writing Frame (next page) and think about your planet. When you have a good idea what your planet is like, start making it.

Materials and Instructions

- Start with 2 sheets of paper, the biggest paper you have. At the preschool we would use large newsprint or butcher paper. Maybe you have wrapping paper or poster board at home.
- On one of the papers, draw the shape of the planet you have discovered.
- Staple the corners of the 2 sheets of paper, make at X at the top of each paper (so you can match them up later on), and cut along the outline of your planet—you will have 2 copies
- Design your planet on both sides—use markers, stickers, or any other art supplies you have at home. If the paper is thick you can use paint.
- When the design is dry, put the 2 sheets back together (use the Xs to match them) and staple them a little more than half way around. Use newspaper or other crumpled paper to stuff your planet and make it 3-dimensional, then finish stapling.
- Tell your parents about your planet so they can record your discovery on the Writing Frame.
