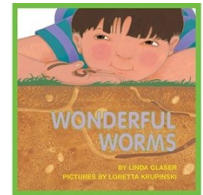

WORM WEEK MATH: Giant Worm Measurement

Supplies: Scissors; string or yarn or ribbon

Instructions: Cut a piece of string that is longer than your leg but shorter than your body– that will be your “giant worm.” Take your giant worm around your house and find things that are longer and shorter than your worm.

WORM WEEK SCIENCE: Observation

Look for earthworms! If it has rained recently you will see them above ground. If the ground is dry, maybe you can pour a bucket of water (or use the garden hose) on the soil, wait a while, and see a worm. Or you can dig in moist soil to find a worm.

Scientists think earthworms come out of their tunnels when it rains to move more quickly across the top of the ground. They need to stay moist so it is hard to move above ground when it is dry.
